Winter Health Tips

The mention of winter evokes images of sparkling snowflakes and skaters gracefully gliding across the ice. But winter can also be a time of illness and injury, if people fail to take adequate health and safety precautions.

Colds

More than 100 viruses can cause colds, the world's most common illness, so few people escape being exposed to at least one of them. In the United States, most people average about three colds every year.

Once it enters the body through the nose or throat, the cold virus begins to multiply, causing any of a number of symptoms: sore throat, sneezing, runny nose, watery eyes, aches and pains, mild fever, nasal congestion and coughing. A cold usually lasts a week or two.

The best way to treat a cold is to take a mild pain reliever, avoid unnecessary activity, get as much bed rest as possible and drink plenty of fluids, especially fruit juices. Over-the-counter cough and cold remedies may relieve some of the symptoms, but they will not prevent, cure or even shorten the course of the illness.

While there is no vaccine to protect you from catching a cold, there are ways to lessen your chances of coming down with the illness. Keep up your natural resistance through good nutrition and getting enough sleep and exercise. Turn your thermostat down and keep the humidity up in your home. Dry air dries out the mucous membranes in your nose and throat and causes them to crack, creating a place where cold viruses can enter your body. Avoid direct contact with those who have colds and wash your hands frequently.

Influenza

A contagious respiratory infection, influenza is not a serious health threat for most people. However, for the elderly or those who have a chronic health problem, influenza can result in serious complications, such as pneumonia.

Symptoms of the flu usually develop suddenly, about three days after being exposed to the virus. They include fever, chills, cough, sore throat, runny nose, and soreness and aching in the back, arms and legs. Although these are similar to those caused by cold viruses, flu symptoms tend to be more severe and to last longer. Abdominal cramps, vomiting or diarrhea symptoms of what is commonly called stomach or intestinal flu do not accompany influenza.

The flu is highly contagious and, if it occurs in your family or community, there is no practical way to avoid exposure to the virus. Bed rest, a mild pain reliever and lots of fluids are the best treatment. (Caution: Unless advised by a physician, a child or teenager with a flu-like illness should not take aspirin. Its use in the presence of a flu infection is linked with an increased risk of Reye syndrome. Instead use another mild pain reliever that does not contain aspirin.) Antibiotics are not effective against flu viruses.

Flu vaccines, while not always effective in preventing the illness, do reduce the severity of the symptoms and protect against complications that could develop. The shots are strongly recommended for persons 65 years of age and older and those who suffer from such chronic health problems as heart disease, respiratory problems, renal disease, diabetes, anemia or any disease that weakens the body's immune system. Infants, children and young people up to 18 years of age who are receiving long-term treatment with aspirin should also get a flu shot. Persons allergic to eggs or who have a high fever, however, should avoid or postpone getting a flu shot.



Because influenza vaccine is only effective for one year and viruses vary from year to year, it is necessary to get a flu shot every year. In Illinois, the flu season usually begins in November and lasts until around the middle of April. If you plan to get a flu shot do so early since it takes about two weeks to develop full immunity. However, even a shot in January may protect against a late winter outbreak.

Hypothermia

Hypothermia a drop in body temperature to 95 degrees or less can be fatal if not detected promptly and treated properly. In the United States, about 700 deaths occur each year from hypothermia.

While hypothermia can happen to anyone, the elderly run the highest risk because their bodies often do not adjust to changes in temperature quickly and they may be unaware that they are gradually getting colder. The condition usually develops over a period of time, anywhere from a few days to several weeks, and even mildly cool indoor temperatures of 60 to 65 degrees can trigger it. If you have elderly relatives or friends who live alone, encourage them to set their thermostats above 65 degrees to avoid hypothermia.

When the body temperature drops, the blood vessels near the surface of the body narrow to reduce heat loss. Muscles begin to tighten to make heat. If the body temperature continues to drop, the person will begin to shiver. The shivering continues until the temperature drops to about 90 degrees. Body temperatures below 90 degrees create a life-threatening situation.

Signs of hypothermia include forgetfulness, drowsiness, slurred speech, change in appearance (e.g., puffy face), weak pulse, slow heartbeat, and very slow and shallow breathing. If the body temperature drops to or below 86 degrees, a person may slip into a coma or have a death-like appearance.

If you notice these symptoms in a person, take his or her temperature. If it is 95 degrees or below, call a doctor or ambulance or take the victim directly to a hospital. To prevent further heat loss, wrap the patient in a warm blanket. A hot water bottle or electric heating pad (set on low) can be applied to the person's stomach. If the victim is alert, give small quantities of warm food or drink.

There are several things you should not do to a hypothermia victim. Do not give alcoholic beverages. Do not give a hot shower or bath, since it could cause shock. Generally, do not try to treat hypothermia at home. The condition should be treated in a hospital.

Frostbite

The parts of the body most affected by frostbite are exposed areas of the face (cheeks, nose, chin, forehead), the ears, wrists, hands and feet. Frostbitten skin is whitish and stiff and feels numb rather than painful. When spending time outdoors during cold weather, be alert for signs of frostbite and, if you notice any, take immediate action.

To treat frostbite, warm the affected part of the body gradually. Wrap the area in blankets, sweaters, coats, etc. If no warm wrappings are available, place frostbitten hands under the armpits or use your body to cover the affected area. Seek medical attention immediately.

Do not rub frostbitten areas; the friction can damage the tissue. Do not apply snow to frostbitten areas. Because its temperature is below freezing, snow will aggravate the condition.

Lost and Found or Safe and Sound: How to Solve Mysteries of Old Bank Accounts

Have you ever found an old bank statement, passbook, certificate of deposit or receipt for a safe deposit box and wondered if there is “lost” money or other assets waiting for you or a loved one? This is especially a common occurrence for people who serve as an executor of a deceased person’s estate or as a financial caregiver for an ill or elderly friend or relative. To help you research old bank accounts and, perhaps, recover something valuable, Marquette Club offers these tips.

First determine whether the bank is open (perhaps under a different name), closed or has merged with another bank.

The FDIC’s Bank Find, an online database that enables you to trace the history of any FDIC-insured institution, is at: www2.fdic.gov/idasp/main_bankfind.asp. That Web site also has contact information for open institutions.

If the bank is still open, ask if it still has the account or safe deposit box in your name or the name of your loved one.

Note: If you inquire about someone else’s deposit account or safe deposit box, the bank will likely require you to produce documentation such as a death certificate and a court appointment as executor if the person is dead, or a power of attorney or similar directive giving you the legal right to handle these matters for a living person.

The bank may be able to tell you what happened to the money or property. The owner may have already closed the account (which FDIC officials say is frequently the case). The assets may still be at the bank. Or, the account may have been classified as abandoned after a period of time set by state law. If the latter, the bank would have transferred any money or valuables to the unclaimed property office in the state of the owner’s last known address.

However, also be prepared for the bank to have no record of the account. This can occur when the account was closed or transferred to the state so long ago that it has been removed from the bank’s computer system and paper records.

To determine whether any money or property is being held by a state government, you can do a free search at: www.unclaimed.org, a Web site of the National Association of Unclaimed Property Administrators, or www.missingmoney.com, a database of unclaimed property records in most states.

If the bank has failed relatively recently, the FDIC or another financial institution assuming the failed bank’s business may have possession of the deposits or valuables (if the account owner

hasn’t already removed them). But following a certain period of inactivity, the FDIC or the other bank will turn unclaimed property over to the state — after 18 months in the case of deposit accounts (under federal law) and after one or more years for the contents of safe deposit boxes (in accordance with state law).

For more help or information from the FDIC about failed banks and unclaimed property, start at: www2.fdic.gov/funds/index.asp. If you need additional assistance, you can speak to an FDIC specialist on failed-bank matters toll-free at 1-888-206-4662 or fill out the Customer Assistance Form at: www2.fdic.gov/starsmail/index.asp.

You can collect the assets by showing satisfactory proof of ownership. Sometimes assets transferred to a state unclaimed property office may have already been sold because there was no space left to store them. In most cases, the original owner or heirs still have the right to claim the proceeds from that sale.



And if you decide you want someone else to guide your search and assist with a claim because your case seems unusually complex, there are reputable companies that will do that for a fee. But remember, you don’t need anyone’s help to make a claim, and it costs nothing. Most importantly, be on guard against fraud or scams. Beware of people who demand money up-front to help you claim your property by offering services that you could perform on your own for free.

Take precautions to keep bank accounts from getting lost in the first place.

Doing so can ensure that you or others won’t spend countless hours on a futile search.

Start by keeping good, detailed records. Be sure to update them once a year or as changes occur and include information about which accounts have been cashed, closed or transferred to another institution.

It also helps to shred and dispose of documents for accounts that you no longer own. If you need to keep some records for tax or other purposes, clearly mark them to indicate that the account itself has been closed.

Also, make sure that the companies holding or owing you money have your current address and accurate name. If you move, write (don’t just call) your banks, brokers and other holders of your assets.

- **Watch for missing mail**
Particularly account statements and bills that do not arrive when expected.
- **Review your monthly statements regularly**
For any unauthorized charges through the Internet, phone or ATM statements.
- **Order your free credit reports**
Once a year from each of the three credit reporting agencies to ensure accuracy. Go to the Federal Trade Commission's authorized web site: www.annualcreditreport.com for your free credit report.
- **Do business with companies you know are reputable**
Especially online. When conducting business online, use firewalls, anti-spyware and anti-virus software and never respond to unsolicited requests for personal information.
- **Protect your PINs and passwords**
Use a combination of letters and numbers for your passwords and change them periodically.
- **Report suspected fraud immediately**
To your bank and the fraud units of the three credit reporting agencies. Also file a police report with your local police or where the identity theft occurred.
